A 10-DAY PRAYER PLAN

(Exodus 20:3-17)

The Call to Obedience: A Journey of Repentance and Submission

Forward

Dear Friend,

This 10-day prayer plan is born out of a profound burden and deep love, created in response to God's persistent call for us to return to Him through obedience and genuine repentance.

We recognize that fulfilling God's perfect Law is not possible through mere human effort, but requires His divine grace and mercy. This plan is designed to be your steadfast guide, intentionally leading you back to the foundation of God's perfect commandments so that you may walk confidently in His ways and open your heart fully to His truth.

As Jesus states, "If you love Me, you will keep My commandments." The first step on this journey is simple yet powerful: Love God and request His forgiveness to blot out all transgressions.

Our ultimate purpose is to diligently seek first God's Kingdom and His righteousness. By actively following the commandments—worshiping Him alone, honoring the Sabbath, loving our neighbor, and bearing witness to the truth (Exodus 20:3-17)—we prepare ourselves to enter His presence and obtain the reward of eternity and everlasting life given to us through His Son, Jesus.

Use this plan to wholeheartedly seek God's face, follow His commands, and be eternally blessed!



Day 1: Idolatry

The First Commandment declares, “You shall have no other gods before Me.” (Exodus 20:3) It reminds us that God alone is to be worshiped, exalted, and reverently honored. Worshipping and serving anything other than the Almighty God is deeply unacceptable in His sight. Anything that takes His place in our hearts becomes an idol.

This commandment challenges us to examine our hearts and lives and ask: Who is truly the Lord of my life? What am I really worshiping and serving without even noticing? Even as followers of Jesus today, we may not build a golden calf like the Israelites (Exodus 32:1–3), yet we still struggle to keep God first. In our time, idolatry often appears in soft, hidden ways that call for prayerful attention.

The Idol of Self

We can easily place ourselves above God, trusting our plans more than His, insisting on control, or expecting God to fit into our agenda. When we refuse to surrender, we end up worshiping ourselves rather than the One who created us.

The Idol of What We Love Most

Good things: family, work, dreams, success, money, or even technology can become idols when they matter more to us than God. Every blessing is a gift from Him, but when our focus shifts from the Giver to the gift, our hearts drift into idolatry.

Scripture warns us never to provoke the Lord's anger by turning aside to false gods. Instead, we are called to seek His face, fix our eyes on Him alone, and worship Him in spirit and in truth.

Prayer Focus: Let your focus be shifted towards God, don't let your priority be towards other people or things. Recognize the power and holiness of God. Respect and revere His exclusiveness and rarity.

Daily Prayer: Dear Heavenly Father, we give You praise and honor. There is none like You, and Your name is above all names. Let us come to know You, Lord, that we may glorify and worship You and Your Holy name. Let all things be in submission to You and You alone. Help us to exalt You, to prioritize You over everything. Humble our spirits, Father, that we may receive an ability to submit to You, God, in Jesus' name, Amen.

Bible Verse:

- “Hear, O Israel: ^[a]The Lord our God, the Lord *is* one! Deuteronomy 6:4 NKJV

- because they have forsaken Me and burned incense to other gods, that they might provoke Me to anger with all the works of their hands. Therefore My wrath shall be aroused against this place and shall not be quenched.’ ’ ’ 2 Kings 22:17 NKJV



Day 2: Images

The Second Commandment declares, “You shall not make for yourself a carved image... you shall not bow down to them nor serve them” (Exodus 20:4-5).

The first commandment tells us who we should worship: the one true God. The second commandment focuses on how we worship and serve. God makes it clear that we must not create carved images or worship Him in ways He has not commanded. Scripture warns, “Let all be put to shame who serve carved images, who boast of idols. Worship Him, all you gods” (Psalm 97:7).

We must neither pray to idols nor put our trust in any created things (gold, wood, or stone, etc), taking correction from the Israelites who provoked God by worshipping the golden calf (Exodus 32:1-8). God is merciful and ready to forgive when we turn from serving false images.

Beware of Worldly Influence

Many items in our homes—decorations, gifts, even everyday objects—are manufactured in cultures that worship idols and foreign gods (Deuteronomy 4:28). These objects, whether toys, symbols, or images, can unknowingly carry negative spiritual influences or evil spirits. It is wise to seek God’s guidance and ask Him to show us what needs to be removed or dedicated to Him. Clearing out spiritual barriers creates space for God’s presence, blessing, and peace to dwell fully in our homes.

Beware of Hidden Idols in the Heart

Jesus warned about false prophets and deception. Matthew 7:15 says, “Watch out for false prophets, who come to you in sheep's clothing but inwardly are ravenous wolves.” Satan is the father of lies. Since sin entered the world, people have believed lies without realizing it. Scripture also teaches that human minds can become depraved and corrupted when separated from God. (2 Timothy 3:8). Our hearts can turn almost anything into an idol. Money, relationships, comfort, pleasure, power, or success can quietly take God’s place.

Scripture calls us to fix our eyes on Jesus Christ, the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, and follow God wholeheartedly!

Prayer Focus: Acknowledge and repent of all forms of idolatry, both explicit (carved images) and implicit (cherishing possessions, money, or obsessions more than God). Ask for God’s forgiveness and mercy (Exodus 20:4-5).

Daily Prayer: Holy Father, worthy is Your Name. Be gracious, Lord, and mercifully forgive my sins, particularly where I have unknowingly worshipped idols. Cleanse and sanctify me. Open my spiritual eyes to see what images and decorations to remove from my home. Deliver us from all evil influence, cast out every unclean spirit, and free me from obsession. Help us to serve and worship You alone, as the God of heaven, forever and ever. In Jesus' mighty name. Amen.

Bible Verse:

- “You shall not make for yourself a carved image—any likeness of anything that is in heaven above, or that is in the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth; you shall not bow down to them nor serve them...” Exodus 20:4-6 NKJV
- “And there you will serve gods, the work of men’s hands, wood and stone, which neither see nor hear nor eat nor smell.” Deuteronomy 4:28 NKJV
- Let all be put to shame who serve carved images, who boast of idols.
Worship Him, all *you* gods. Psalms 97:7 NKJV
- looking unto Jesus, the ^[a]author and ^[b]finisher of *our* faith, who for the joy that was set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and has sat down at the right hand of the throne of God. Hebrews 12:2 NKJV
- Now, as Jannes and Jambres resisted Moses, so do these also resist the truth: men of corrupt minds, disapproved concerning the faith; 2Timothy 2:8 NKJV
- “Beware of false prophets, who come to you in sheep’s clothing, but inwardly they are ravenous wolves. Matthew 7:15 NKJV



Day 3: Oaths

The Third Commandment is clear: “You shall not take the name of the LORD your God in vain” (Exodus 20:7). It forbids speaking about God carelessly or falsely representing God. In Scripture, a name is more than a label. It reflects a person’s nature, character, and identity. The name of the Lord is a strong tower (Proverbs 18:10) and must be treated with reverence, respect, and honor. Those who truly know the Lord revere God’s holy name, exercising great caution to avoid using it in vain.

Do Not Swear:

We must be cautious not to use God’s name to swear, make false promises, or sign untruthful agreements. The Bible teaches, “Do not swear either by heaven or by earth, or with any other oath...but let your “Yes” be “Yes,” and your “No,” “No,” (James 5:12). Jesus also says, “Do not swear at all: neither by heaven, for it is God’s throne; nor by the earth, for it is His footstool” (Matthew 5:34-36) God’s name is holy never be used as a tool to prove or support something false.

Representing God Well

Wherever we go, in the workplace, ministry, or community, we represent God. We are His ambassadors. Our words, attitudes, and actions shape how others see and understand God, especially those who have not yet believed. We must be the reason someone turns to God. When serving in missions or ministry, we go with a humble heart. We bring the gospel, not obstacles. Our character should be helping someone come to know the Lord.

Honor the Name of the Lord

If we truly love and fear God, we will honor His name. Let us confess and repent of any time we have used God’s name in vain, seeking His mercy and forgiveness.

Prayer Focus: Humbly confess and repent for every time the name of the Lord (Yahweh, Jesus Christ) has been used lightly, in jest, as a curse, or to swear a false oath, recognizing this as taking His name in vain (Exodus 20:7).

Daily Prayer: Everlasting Father, great and mighty God, hallowed be Your name forever. I humbly ask Your forgiveness for the many times I have used Your holy name in vain. Please pardon my iniquities. Now that I understand the greatness of Your name, help me, Holy Spirit, I ask You to caution me always against blasphemy or swearing falsely and using God’s name irreverently. I commit to praising, honoring, and glorifying the name of the Lord God forevermore. In Jesus’ name, amen.

Bible Verse:

- “And whoever blasphemes the name of the LORD shall surely be put to death. All the congregation shall certainly stone him, the stranger as well as him who is born in the

land. When he blasphemes the name of the LORD, he shall be put to death.” Leviticus 24:16 NKJV

- The name of the LORD is a strong tower; The righteous run to it and are safe.” Proverbs 18:10 NKJV
- But I say to you, do not swear at all: neither by heaven, for it is God’s throne; nor by the earth, for it is His footstool; nor by Jerusalem, for it is the city of the great King. Nor shall you swear by your head, because you cannot make one hair white or black. Matthew 5:34-36 NKJV



Day 4: Rest

The Fourth Commandment calls us to remember the Sabbath and keep it holy. God gives us six days to work, but the seventh day is set apart as the Sabbath of the Lord (Exodus 20:9–10). Just as God rested after creation (Exodus 20:11), He established the Sabbath not as a burden, but as a gracious gift—for our spiritual and physical renewal. Jesus said, “The Sabbath was made for man, and not man for the Sabbath” (Mark 2:27). Rest is a priceless gift for us from God. The Sabbath is a priceless gift made for us by a loving God

Receive the Gift of Rest

Accept God’s gift of one day of rest each week. Humbly acknowledge that we need it. Sabbath rest is an act of trust, ceasing from work to remember that God alone is our Provider. As we lay down worry, striving, and self-reliance, we turn our full focus toward Him. This is a day to realign our hearts, deepen our love for God, and delight in His presence.

Honor God in Your Rest

We honor the Lord not only through diligent work but also through our willingness to rest. Embrace the Sabbath as a holy day, set apart for worship, renewal, and spiritual joy, and step into the blessing and restoration God has prepared for you.

Prayer Focus: In the beginning, God created the Heavens and the Earth and spent six days creating all that is in Heaven and on Earth. And on the seventh day, He saw that all that He had made was good, and so He rested from all the work He had done. So this day is a reminder for us to relax and not overwork, but also a moment to cherish and appreciate the work God did when He created the world.

Daily Prayer: Dear Father, help us to rest in You, help us to keep the Sabbath set apart from the other days, to give honor and praise to what You have completed in Your creation, and the completion You’ve made in our spirits in Christ and His sacrifice on the cross. Lord, we give thanks to You for showing us what it means to rest; thank You for showing us and giving us a way to stop and reflect in Your presence, and for the work that You have done in us and in the world. In Jesus’ name, let us continue to rest when needed, to reflect on You, Your Word, and Your Spirit, and to keep this special day holy, Amen.

Bible Verse:

- Six days you shall labor and do all your work, but the seventh day is the Sabbath of the Lord your God. In it you shall do no work: you, nor your son, nor your daughter, nor your male servant, nor your female servant, nor your cattle, nor your stranger who is within your gates. Exodus 20:9-10 NKJV

- For in six days the Lord made the heavens and the earth, the sea, and all that is in them, and rested the seventh day. Therefore, the Lord blessed the Sabbath day and hallowed it. Exodus 20:11 NKJV
- And on the seventh day God ended His work which He had done, and He rested on the seventh day from all His work which He had done. Then God blessed the seventh day and sanctified it, because in it He rested from all His work which God had created and made. Genesis 2:2-3 NKJV



Day 5: Honor

The Fifth Commandment states: "Honor your father and your mother, that your days may be long upon the land which the Lord your God is giving you" (Exodus 20:12). This is the only commandment attached to a promise of long life.

To honor is to show love, respect, and obedience. God commands us to honor our parents because the family is the first place where authority and character are formed. The home is where we learn discipline, respect, and responsibility. Before we ever learn to submit to God, we learn to submit within the family. Our response to parental instruction shapes how we respond to correction, guidance, and ultimately to the Lord Himself.

This commandment carries a unique promise. Scripture reminds us: "Honor your father and mother, which is the first commandment with a promise" (Ephesians 6:2). Honoring parents is not just an obligation; it forms a heart that chooses what is right and brings strength to serve God better.

Prayer Focus: Confess any instances of disrespect, disobedience, or failure to honor your parents, seeking forgiveness for breaking the commandment of God that holds the promise of long life (Exodus 20:12).

Daily Prayer: Loving Father, God of all grace, please pour out Your grace upon me. Be merciful and forgive me for the times I have failed to listen to and honor my parents, as You commanded. Though I am accountable, Your mercy is sufficient to cover my sins. Help me be a faithful and obedient child. Fill my heart with mutual love. Teach me Your path and guide me, O LORD, so my ways and my actions may honor You and my parents. O God, reexamine the foundation of our home, rebuild what is broken, restore what is lost, and heal my family. Lord, grant me wisdom to make my parents proud and bring You glory forever. In Jesus' precious name, amen.

Bible Verse:

- "Honor your father and your mother, that your days may be long upon the land which the Lord your God is giving you." Exodus 20:12 NKJV
- "He will turn the hearts of the parents to their children, and the hearts of the children to their parents; or else I will come and strike the land with total destruction." Malachi 4:6
- "Train up a child in the way he should go, And when he is old he will not depart from it." Proverbs 22:6

- “When you eat the labor of your hands, You shall be happy, and it shall be well with you.” Psalm 128:2
- “So it was, when the days of feasting had run their course, that Job would send and sanctify them, and he would rise early in the morning and offer burnt offerings according to the number of them all. For Job said, “It may be that my sons have sinned and cursed God in their hearts.” Thus Job did regularly.” Job 1:5



Day 6: Anger

God is the author of life, and every person is created in His image. The Sixth Commandment reminds us that “You shall not murder” (Exodus 20:13) is more than avoiding physical killing; it also addresses the anger and contempt that can harden our hearts toward others. This is a call to guard our hearts against anger and strive for reconciliation and peace.

The story of Cain and Abel shows us the destructive power of anger. Cain’s rage over God’s rejection of his offering led him to murder his brother (Genesis 4:6-8). The Lord’s response reminds us that shedding innocent blood cries out to Him for justice (Genesis 4:10) and brings consequences (Genesis 4:11-12).

Jesus invites us to live a different way of life.

- Be quick to listen, slow to speak, and slow to anger (James 1:19).
- Learn from Jesus, who is gentle and humble in heart (Matthew 11:29).
- Walk in the fruit of the Spirit—gentleness and self-control (Galatians 5:23).

Prayer Focus: Anger, when unchecked, can harden our hearts and can lead us to be hateful and resentful towards ourselves and others. Sometimes it can be hard not to be angry at people or things in life, especially when provoked. We want to look upon Jesus as an example of how to handle these situations, but also reflect on what He taught regarding anger, and how it takes a spiritual toll on our souls when we walk in anger.

Prayer: Lord God, give us the strength to exercise self-control and the patience with those who may bring us to anger, that we can find a resolution that can remove the anger from our hearts. Help us carry the love that You showed through Your Son Yeshua, that we may not be tempted to sin in our anger. Holy Spirit, guide us and protect us; let us not give the devil a foothold in our day. In Jesus’ name, we rebuke any murderous spirit that may drive us to remain angry, or any spirit of provocation that provokes us to unrighteous anger, Amen.

Bible Verse: "

- “You have heard that it was said to those of old, ‘You shall not murder, and whoever murders will be in danger of the judgment.’ Matthew 5:21 NKJV
- So the Lord said to Cain, “Why are you angry? And why has your countenance fallen? If you do well, will you not be accepted? And if you do not do well, sin lies at the door. And its desire *is* for you, but you should rule over it.” Now Cain ^[b]talked with Abel, his ^[a]brother; and it came to pass, when they were in the field, that Cain rose against Abel his brother and killed him. Genesis 4:6-8 NKJV
- And He said, “What have you done? The voice of your brother’s blood cries out to Me from the ground. Genesis 4:10 NKJV

- So now you *are* cursed from the earth, which has opened its mouth to receive your brother's blood from your hand. When you till the ground, it shall no longer yield its strength to you. A fugitive and a vagabond you shall be on the earth." Genesis 4:11-12 NKJV
- So then, my beloved brethren, let every man be swift to hear, slow to speak, slow to wrath; James 1:19 NKJV
- Take My yoke upon you and learn from Me, for I am^[a]gentle and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. Matthew 11:29 NKJV
- gentleness, self-control. Against such, there is no law. Galatians 5:23 NKJV



Day 7: Lust

The Seventh Commandment states, “You shall not commit adultery.” (Exodus 20:14) This command is God’s loving protection. When we allow the lust of the flesh to take root, it leads to devastating consequences, as seen when King David's desire for Bathsheba resulted in adultery, unwanted pregnancy, and murder. (2 Samuel 11:2, 15-17)

Jesus warns us that sin begins with the eyes and the heart: the very thought of lust is adultery in God's sight! "Whoever looks at a woman to lust for her has already committed adultery with her in his heart" (Matthew 5:28). Lust corrupts what God created to be pure. Proverbs warns, "A man who commits adultery has no sense; whoever does so destroys himself" (Proverbs 6:32).

Marriage is God’s design (Genesis 2:24), and lust pulls the heart away from that design. It tempts us to trade what matters most for what our flesh craves now. Your body is the temple of the Holy Spirit. (1 Corinthians 6:19). Preserve its holiness! By walking in purity, you honor this sacred dwelling and align your life with the wisdom and love of the God who seeks to keep you from all sin.

Prayer Focus: Let us recognize that lust is not just about what we do on the outside, but what we do on the inside as well. It’s the content of our hearts that we need to be soberly vigilant towards. Remember that it’s not the things that we put in us that defile us, but the things that we bring out of us that bring defilement.

Daily Prayer: Dear Heavenly Father, we ask, in the name of Jesus, that Your Holy Spirit purifies our hearts and minds, so that we may not fall victim to the thoughts and feelings of lust. Holy Spirit, help us to live righteously, help us to abstain from carrying on an adulterous heart. Set us free from the attachments that our flesh places on our hearts. Jesus, restore us to live as God has called us to live, Amen.

Bible verse:

- Then it happened one evening that David arose from his bed and walked on the roof of the king’s house. And from the roof, he saw a woman bathing, and the woman *was* very beautiful to behold. 2 Samuel 11:2 NKJV
- And he wrote in the letter, saying, “Set Uriah in the forefront of the ^[a]hottest battle, and retreat from him, that he may be struck down and die.” So it was, while Joab besieged the city, that he assigned Uriah to a place where he knew there *were valiant* men. Then the men of the city came out and fought with Joab. And *some* of the people of the servants of David fell; and Uriah the Hittite died also. 2 Samuel 11:15-17 NKJV

- But I say to you that whoever looks at a woman to lust for her has already committed adultery with her in his heart. Matthew 5:28 NKJV
- Therefore, a man shall leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and they shall become one flesh. Genesis 2:24 NKJV
- Or do you not know that your body is the temple of the Holy Spirit *who is* in you, whom you have from God, and you are not your own? 1 Corinthians 6:19 NKJV



Day 8: Restoration

The Eighth Commandment says: “You shall not steal” (Exodus 20:15). God warns us against stealing what is not ours. Stealing is not only about physical property. It also includes taking credit, damaging someone’s reputation, or blocking someone’s opportunity to advance ourselves. Any gain that comes at another person’s unwilling expense is theft.

Stealing Opposes God: Stealing, killing, and destroying are the goals of the Enemy, opposing God's desire for us to have life abundantly (John 10:10). Anyone who steals becomes an enemy of God, yet God calls all sinners to repentance (Ezekiel 18:23).

The Root of Theft is Greed: People often steal due to greed and discontentment. (1 Timothy 6:10) and failing to ask God for what they need. As James 4:2-3 states, we often "do not have because you do not ask," or we ask with the wrong motive. God calls us to be content with what He provides and to resist the lie that we always need more. When gratitude fills the heart, greed has no place. May we be content with what God has entrusted to us.

Trust God's Provision: Instead of resorting to theft, we must humbly ask God for our daily provisions, the things we need. He is our faithful Provider and assures us: "My God shall supply all your need according to his riches in glory by Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:19).

Prayer Focus: Humbly confess any instance of stealing, taking property dishonestly, or engaging in forbidden corruption like bribery. Pray for genuine repentance and the grace to make full restitution where required, seeking to restore what was taken with compensation, aligning with God's justice (Exodus 22:1-14).

Daily Prayer: Good God, awesome and caring Father, have mercy upon me. Forgive me wherever I have stolen, looted, or oppressed the innocent. Blot out my greed and discontentment, Lord, and be gracious to me. Grant me the grace to return what I have stolen with reward, and help me cease taking bribes. Uphold me to live by Your Word, fully trusting that You are my Provider, for "The LORD is my Shepherd; I shall not want." I am truly repentant, LORD, and I desire to please and praise You all my life now and always. In Jesus' holy name, amen.

Bible Verse:

- “The thief does not come except to steal, and to kill, and to destroy. I have come that they may have life, and that they may have it more abundantly.” John 10:10 NKJV
- Do I have any pleasure at all that the wicked should die?” says the Lord God, “and not that he should turn from his ways and live? Ezekiel 18:23 NKJV

- For the love of money is a root of all *kinds of evil*, for which some have strayed from the faith in their greediness, and pierced themselves through with many sorrows. 1 Timothy 6:10 NKJV
- “You lust and do not have. You murder and covet and cannot obtain. You fight and wage war. Yet you do not have because you do not ask. You ask and do not receive, because you ask amiss, that you may spend it on your pleasures.” James 4:2-3 NKJV



Day 9: Witness

The Ninth Commandment declares, “ You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor.” (Exodus 20:16) We are called to be witnesses to speak the truth and testify faithfully. Jesus told his disciples, “ And you also must testify, for you have been with me from the beginning.” (John 15:27)

In today’s digital age, this mandate can be especially challenging. Online spaces often mirror the worst aspects of the physical world—they are filled with verbal assaults, fake news, misrepresentations, half-truths, and the careless erosion of reputations through quick, thoughtless posts.

The book of Proverbs warns, “Death and life are in the power of the tongue” (Proverbs 18:21). Our words carry profound responsibility. When we tell a lie or engage in false witness, we threaten not only individuals but also the entire community. False witness stirs division, creates conflict, and can destroy relationships by breaking trust.

In every situation, whether behind a screen or face-to-face, we are called as children of God to stand for the truth. It is the truth alone that sets us free and sets us apart from the world (John 8:32).

Prayer Focus: Pray that God shows you what it means to be a good witness. Let the Holy Spirit guide your heart to be more honest about what you become aware of. We are called to be witnesses of the Gospel, to bear witness to Jesus, and the sacrifice He made for us.

Daily Prayer: Dear God, thank You for sending Your Son, Jesus, to be a witness of truth. Help us, Father, to reflect Christ’s righteousness. Jesus, You are the Way, the Truth, and the Life. You are the perfect example, the cornerstone, the perfect witness to God and His glory. Holy Spirit, direct our spirits to live honestly, and convict us when we bear false witness, in Jesus’ name, Amen.

Bible Verse:

- Death and life *are* in the power of the tongue, and those who love it will eat its fruit. Proverbs 18:21 NKJV
- And you shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free.” John 8:32 NKJV



Day 10: Covet

The Tenth Commandment forbids the deep desire for another's possessions: "You shall not covet your neighbor's house; you shall not covet your neighbor's wife... nor anything that is your neighbor's" (Exodus 20:17).

To covet is to eagerly desire what belongs to others, leading to envy and jealousy (Psalm 73:3). God wants us to be satisfied and content, not envious of the prosperity of the wicked. Instead of fretting, we are called to: "Trust in the Lord, and do good... Delight yourself also in the Lord, and He shall give you the desires of your heart" (Psalm 37:1, 3-4).

Discontentment is the root of covetousness. It weakens our guard and opens the heart to temptation. We live in a world flooded with advertising, social media highlights, and constant displays of what others achieve. These messages whisper the lie that we are behind or lacking, and over time, they clutter the heart. When our minds stay fixed on what we do not have, we forget the blessings we already have.

True contentment comes from God's presence, not His provision. We should look for His face before His hands. When we walk closely with Him, contentment grows naturally. It is a condition of the heart, not the environment. Contentment flows from knowing Him, loving Him, and obeying His commandments.

Hebrews 13:5 reminds us, "Let your conduct be without covetousness. Be content with what you have. For He Himself has said, 'I will never leave you nor forsake you.'" He is with us, and we have everything that we need.

Prayer Focus: Ask for vigilance against covetousness, recognizing its danger in leading to greater sin, and claim God's faithful mercy and forgiveness where you have fallen short. Pray for a heart that is truly satisfied and content with what God has provided, asking for deliverance from the temptation to fret or obsess over the prosperity of others (Psalm 73:3).

Daily Prayer: Father Lord, gracious and merciful God, You know my heart completely. Forgive me if I have coveted or envied my neighbor, for I know I have sinned against Your commandment. By Your abundant grace, pardon all my wrongdoing and correct my mistakes. Help me become a cheerful giver and grant me contentment with all Your blessings. I repent of the jealousy in my eyes, lips, and heart. Lord, renew every part of me, make me whole and upright in Your sight, and favor me always. I ask You to be my daily portion, guarding me from poverty and excessive wealth, "Lest I be full and deny You... Or lest I be poor and steal" (Proverbs 30:8-9). May I glorify Your name forever. In Jesus' name, amen.

Bible Verse:

- "For I was envious of the boastful, When I saw the prosperity of the wicked." Psalms 73:3 NKJV

- “Do not fret because of evildoers, Nor be envious of the workers of iniquity. Trust in the Lord, and do good; Dwell in the land, and feed on His faithfulness. Delight yourself also in the Lord, and He shall give you the desires of your heart. Commit your way to the Lord, Trust also in Him, And He shall bring it to pass.” Psalms 37:1, 3-5 NKJV



Day 11: Love

"Which is the greatest commandment?" Jesus replied: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind." This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: "Love your neighbor as yourself." (Matthew 22:36-39)

To love God wholeheartedly means putting Him first in everything—our thoughts, hearts, words, and actions—making every moment an act of devotion and glory to Him. "Therefore, whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do all to the glory of God." (1 Corinthians 10:31)

God's love for us is immeasurable. He loved us so deeply that He sent His only begotten Son to die for our sins (John 3:16). His love endures from generation to generation; it never fails. Through His Agape love, we are saved and called children of God. It is a privilege not earned by our perfection, but given freely by His grace and mercy.

We are blessed to be a blessing to others. "We love because He first loved us" (1 John 4:19). Our neighbor, like the one in the parable of the Good Samaritan, is anyone in need, regardless of status or background (Luke 10:30-35). God's love shows no favoritism, no partiality, and no condemnation. And we are called to reflect that same love in our own lives.

Just as Jesus concluded with a profound reminder of what it means to follow Him: "If you love Me, keep My commandments" (John 14:15). Our obedience is not a burden, but the natural overflow of a heart that truly loves the Savior.

Prayer Focus: Acknowledge that obedience flows from intimacy and a love for the Father. Pray for the commitment to keep God's commandments as a direct response to His love ("If you love Me, you will keep My commandments"). Pray for the heart to be returned to the "first love" and for God's love to be demonstrated to the world through your life.

Daily Prayer: Everlasting Father, awesome and mighty God, we thank You for loving us first and showcasing Your perfect love by sending Your only Son, Jesus Christ, to die for our sins. Father, guide us into the knowledge of Your love—the greatest commandment—that we may understand the depth of Your affection and let it transform our hearts. Forgive us, Lord, if we have not loved You above our immortal body and above everything else that the earth could offer. Father, help us love one another genuinely, extending Your grace and love to both neighbors and those who oppose the Gospel of Christ. We recognize that true obedience comes through intimacy with You and honoring Your Word, as Your Word promises, "If you love Me, you will keep My commandments." Bring our hearts back to Your first love so we can reflect Your mercy and love to the world, for we know God is love. With reverence and devotion, we lift our praise to you and glorify you, Lord, our God. Amen.

Bible Verse:

- For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life. John 3:16 NKJV
- Then Jesus answered and said: “A certain *man* went down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell among thieves, who stripped him of his clothing, wounded *him*, and departed, leaving *him* half dead. Now, by chance, a certain priest came down that road. And when he saw him, he passed by on the other side. Likewise, a Levite, when he arrived at the place, came and looked, and passed by on the other side. But a certain Samaritan, as he journeyed, came where he was. And when he saw him, he had compassion. So he went to *him and* bandaged his wounds, pouring on oil and wine; and he set him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him.
